# AGENCY HIGHLIGHTS ON THE HORIZON



Brighton Center has deep roots working with residents in Newport and thanks to a funding opportunity from the Local Initiative Support Corporation (LISC) we are the lead agency advancing the Quality of Life Planning Process within Newport. The Quality of Life Process, developed by LISC, involves Brighton Center leading the effort in interviewing over 100 Newport residents to learn their hopes, dreams, and vision for the future of the community. The results will then be gathered and presented to residents at a community roll-out. The final goal is for the community to develop a Quality of Life Plan that contains strategies and tactics on how to accomplish their vision for the future. The Quality of Life Steering committee consists of Brighton Center staff, Newport residents, business owners, City officials and local school board members.

## NOW ENROLLING...



**Northern Kentucky Scholar House**, set to open in the Fall, is officially accepting applications for single parents enrolled full-time in a post-secondary institution.

Northern Kentucky Scholar House provides the support and pathway to employment success for those who, traditionally, have experienced many barriers to complete their education beyond high school. Not only will parents be able to pursue skills and complete their education to improve their economic security and stability, but simultaneously will be ensuring their children are on a path from the earliest age to engage in lifelong learning.

The Development Team includes **Brighton Properties, Inc.**, Neighborhood Foundations, and The Model Group. After completing construction on the 48 two and three bedroom apartments with an on-site Child Development Center, Brighton Center Inc., will run the educational program giving parents access to a comprehensive array of bundled services and Neighborhood Foundations will manage the apartments.

- Degree seeking, full time students in an approved post-secondary institution: Gateway Community & Technical College, Northern Kentucky University, Cincinnati State

- Eligible for Section 8 subsidized housing
- Eligible to have household utilities in resident's name
- Highly motivated
- Children under 5 years of age must be enrolled in the Scholar House Child Development Center
- Attend life skills workshops and monthly meetings with a case manager who believes in your success!
- Meet current income guidelines for both housing and childcare programs - inquire today!

## GENEROSITY CREATES A THRIVING FAMILY

Ring, Ring, Ring.....imagine picking up the phone to a voice on the other end that changes your life forever. In 2011, while living in Utah, Liz received a frantic phone call from her sister. Her sister could no longer care for her young children. Liz, holding family dear to her, drove from Utah to Kentucky without hesitation in order to keep the children together. She left her home, job, and the life that she built in Utah and returned to her home town in McCreary County, Kentucky to gain full custody of the children.

In 2012, the five children were permanently placed with Liz and soon after moved to Newport Kentucky. Faced with a new set of responsibilities, and children that were depending on her, Liz sought out resources in the Northern Kentucky area and came to Brighton Center. Liz became involved with the **Family Center** and enrolled in the **Stable Families program**. Through Stable Families Liz worked with a Resource Advocate to connect to resources and stabilize her new family life to ensure self-sufficiency.

To help ease the adjustment into their new situation, two of the children enrolled in Brighton Center's **Youth Leadership Development program** so that they would

have after school activities and meet positive peers in a safe environment.

In early 2013, while still adjusting to her new role as guardian, Liz also took custody of a six day old niece born heroin addicted.

Over the past two years, Liz has connected to programs offered through Brighton Center and Newport Public Schools to enhance her parenting skills and the positive development of the children. Liz's hard work and dedication to being a great role model is paying off. The girls continue to stay actively involved in the Youth Leadership Development program and are true leaders.

All the children are doing well in school. Their positive attitudes and decision making are a wonderful testimony to the love, care and generosity that Liz pours into her family.

In addition, Liz recently started working with a Career Coach at **Career Connections** to seek flexible employment opportunities that allow her to earn the necessary income to support the household. She is currently working as an independent distributor for a local business from her home. She wants to remain involved in the direct care of the youngest child, who receives in-home treatment through First

Steps to deal with developmental delays that often comes with babies born addicted.

Liz not only answered a call that changed her life forever, but continues to seek out new opportunities that provide a structure for her and the children to thrive. Liz is not only an incredible role model to her nieces and nephews, but to all she comes in contact with.

Liz sacrificed a single life in Utah for a move to Kentucky and took on the responsibility of six children (ranging in age from 2-16) because she believes in family, and wanted to ensure that the children were not separated and grow up together as a family. She has sought out and received help to do all that is possible to give the children the opportunity to be successful. Her generosity and that of the community have allowed Liz to provide a safe, loving and nurturing environment for the children.

As part of the Cincinnati Enquirer's annual Wish List program, Liz's story was featured along with a list of needed items for the family. The generosity of many donors resulted in \$3,340.10 raised for the family. They received new beds for the children, brand new bedding, a dining room set, love seat, laptop computer, Microsoft software for the laptop, & therapy equipment for the special needs child.

## A FRESH IDEA FOR GIVING BACK

Fresh, nutritious foods are often hard to come by for Newport residents but an innovative idea paired with a collaborative partnership are changing the landscape. After traveling around the country to see how other urban communities were addressing the need for better food options, Doug and Shelia Bray, owners of The Giving Fields, sought to use their expertise for a good cause.

The Newport Community Gardens project grew out of the Bray's desire to bring fresh food options to the area and as part of Brighton Center's strategic plan to support the health and wellness of families. A group of passionate community members, supporters, local organizations including the Campbell County Extension Office and the City of Newport came together to make the project a reality. Brighton Center, St. Paul's Episcopal Church and the Campbell County Detention Center provided plots of land on which 172, 4-foot by 8-foot low-maintenance raised-beds gardens were constructed.

Doug and Shelia Bray played a critical role in providing the needed expertise, bringing together a supportive group of partners,

and securing both monetary and in-kind donations to get the project started.

Residents of Newport now have the opportunity to grow and keep their own produce under the direction of garden mentors and volunteers. They will also have access to educational sessions on how to cook with fresh foods. Surplus produce in garden beds managed by Brighton Center and partners will supply the food pantry with healthy options for families seeking emergency assistance. A portion of the produce will also be sold to local restaurants to keep the gardens sustainable for years to come.

"Our ultimate goal is to prove the concept works and help some of the neighbors eventually put box gardens at their own residence. A large part of the goal is to educate people on how to make better choices and how to grow and prepare healthy foods. Hopefully we can expand this project to other parts of Newport and neighboring towns," Doug said.

## GENEROSITY IN ALL FORMS



The kindergarten through eighth grade students of St. Bernard of Clairveau School made and donated over 60 blankets to the Early Child Succeeds program of Brighton Center! Every Child Succeeds (ECS) is a collaborative evidence-based home visitation program that includes 10 provider agencies (for which Brighton Center is one) whose Social Workers, Child Development Specialists, and Nurses provide services for first-time, at-risk mothers on a regular basis from the time of pregnancy until the child's third birthday.

## FIGHT HUNGER, SPARK CHANGE GIVES NEW FOOD PANTRY LOCATION A \$15,000 BOOST

In the Fall, Brighton Center participated in the Fight Hunger, Spark Change Campaign with the FreeStore Foodbank and two other partner agencies to win a total of \$60,000 split between the four. Thanks to the generosity of so many, we placed in the top 50 for the nation to win \$15,000 of the total. The funding is supporting the newly opened Emergency Assistance services at our Boone County Shelby Street location through providing staffing support and offsetting the costs of food deliveries/logistics to provide hunger relief for Boone County Families.
