Brighton Properties oversees housing development and property management to address the need, and Brighton Center wraps a comprehensive array of services around those being served.

Pat: I have been here 16 years. I

have always lived in Newport. When my house got too big for me, I needed somewhere to go. I knew a woman who was living here, she was blind, and I would help her get to church. She told me I should move into Saratoga. She was older, but she was very independent. Brighton Center helped her in a lot of ways to be more independent.

Jack: I've been here since 2014. Time flies when you're having fun. I was somewhere else before I came here. Saratoga is the best place I have ever lived. You can't believe how nice the facilities are here. They remodeled the whole building -- every single unit from top to bottom. My last place didn't do parties or get-togethers or have social events; they were just a place to live.

Pat: You can always come here and find someone to talk to.

Jack: Yeah, you can always come to talk to people. I like it.

Pat: And if you're tired of talking to people, you can go back to your own room.

Jack: Or read a book. We have a nice library. And a lot of puzzles. Pat: A lot of the residents like to do puzzles. They can do a puzzle in a couple days. I sat there one day for 2.5 hours and found one piece.

Jack: We participate in these events every time they have them.

Pat: We like to play games. We played Scattergories recently, and that was a lot of fun.

Jack: That was a good one.

Pat: Yes, that was a good one. He was sitting over there on his telephone, looking up the answers.

Jack: That's why they call me the cheater. Bingo is our number one sport.

Pat: We're playing Family Feud today.

Jack: You can join us! You can be Steve Harvey.

Pat: We do have fun. We don't always agree on everything, but we get along.

Jack: We love the staff here. I love everything about them. I've never had a bad experience with anybody. We're trying to get a group together to go down to the aquarium, the zoo, or the museum. Brighton Center treats us great. You couldn't go wrong with Brighton Center. If you ever get a chance to visit, we always love to have visitors.

KYLIE'S JOURNEY



I was a kid when I first came to Brighton Center for the Youth Leadership Development (YLD) program. I was looking for guidance and mentorship. At the time, I was a good student and an athlete at Newport Schools, but had some things I wanted to change about myself. Looking back, I think it was an opportunity for growth and experience.

Brighton Center served my family for as far back as I can remember. Growing up in the community, I can recall going

to the Holiday Drive Used Toy Sale and picking out toys I liked. We also received a holiday meal box that provided an amazing, filling holiday dinner.

My life has changed tremendously since I first got involved with YLD in 6th grade. During my senior year of high school, I received the Jean Brown Scholarship. Brighton Center gives the Scholarship to graduating Newport seniors for college. This Scholarship helped me get the necessities I needed for college. I was able to get the laptop I needed for school, and it paid some of my tuition when tuition at my school increased. This Scholarship really helped my transition to college.

Fast forward to now, and I work at Brighton Center, getting to serve the very community that supported me as an Every Child Succeeds Home Visitor. Getting the opportunity to serve the community I grew up in has always been a dream

- Peer Mentors at Brighton Recovery Center provide critical support to fellow residents, lead recovery classes, and provide additional support alongside staff to women on their recovery journey. Kitchen Peer Mentors help with the daily operations of serving meals and being on the catering team for CENTER TABLE, Catering with a Purpose.
- Ambassadors at Center for Employment Training (CET) lead information sessions and tours for prospective trainees along with providing a warm welcome to new starts each week, and are a valuable resource to all trainees throughout their time at CET.
- Northern Kentucky Scholar House Resident Council
 helps to inform programming, provide support to other
 residents, and serve as liaisons to bring resident voice to
 the community.
- Youth Leadership Development club members participate in youth-led service learning projects that help give back to the community.

- Residents in our senior housing communities volunteer as Floor Captains to provide a friendly welcoming environment for new residents, along with ensuring a sense of well-being by being a safety net to other residents in the building.
- Garden Mentors provide their gardening knowledge to others learning how to grow their own food as a part of our 96 bed community garden in Newport.
- Many customers give back through volunteering both with Brighton Center and across the community. They see the impact volunteers have had on their life through our programs and want to pay it forward for someone else.

of mine. Working at Brighton Center allows me to do just that. It's genuinely a blessing.

Being able to graduate college and come back to inspire the youth in the community is something I am incredibly proud of. I know what it's like to feel as though few people believe in you, so to graduate college and show the youth it doesn't matter what other people say or where you are from, you can achieve your dreams.

I've worked at places where I have felt uncomfortable, so having a supervisor who genuinely cares and shows me that she cares about me AND wants to see me succeed and elevate in life helps me see that I have potential and the opportunity to do great things.

When thinking about working for Brighton Center, I think it's unique that the fact that they don't turn anyone away.

Brighton Center is an amazing place to work and be served. The Center has so many resources and people who can help quide and support you in ways to better yourself.



Brighton Center's Jean Brown Memorial Scholarship Fund gives graduating Newport seniors the opportunity to off-set costs of attending college.

The Scholarship was named after Jean Brown, a dedicated Emergency Assistance Advocate at Brighton Center from 1985 until her death in 1995. She was admired for her commitment to the community, her non-judgmental way of reaching out to others, and her positive, uplifting attitude towards life. She had a special gift for encouraging youth and believing in people.

LARIKA'S JOURNEY



I first learned about Brighton Center in 2019 after giving birth to my third child. I was trying to figure out how to manage life as a single mom with three children and work. While seeking out resources, I learned about the Every Child Succeeds program and immediately enrolled. My Home Visitor was extremely helpful in ensuring my child was meeting developmental milestones and in providing a support system to me as a parent and as a person.

I was working at Speedway at the time, but knew I needed to get a more stable job with set hours. I mentioned to my Home Visitor that I had my Certified Nursing Assistant [CNA] credential and had worked in the medical field since I was 19. She told me about Brighton Center's Center for Employment Training [CET] program and the Medical Assisting skill division. This was in 2020, just after COVID had shut everything down, but I was determined to take this opportunity for a better career. I knew with this career opportunity that I would be able to have set hours and a salary where I wouldn't have to worry about our income.

Going back to school at CET was a real leap of faith for me. I wasn't sure how everything would work out, but I could tell the staff truly cared and had my family's best interest at heart. When I first started classes, my children were also doing school online, so we would sit together and all complete our work.

While at CET, my family and I were also connected to additional resources we needed in order to eliminate the many barriers we faced. **Emergency Assistance** services helped with food, clothing, and personal care items, allowing me to use our limited budget to pay for other necessities. The **Stable Families** program helped stabilize our housing situation. At one point, I was living in a hotel, and through this program, we were able to move into an apartment at an affordable monthly rate.

After my son turned two, we graduated from Every Child Succeeds and began Brighton Center's Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters program, which is helping to prepare my youngest for kindergarten. Knowing that he will not have to play catch-up when school starts

and may actually be ahead of his peers is a huge relief to me. My oldest, who is 11, is involved in **Youth Leadership Development**, where she participates in service learning projects, develops leadership skills, and explores education and career opportunities for the future.

I have also benefited from Financial Education and Coaching through workshops and one-on-one financial coaching. I have learned how to budget and better manage my money.

Another challenge that I, like many others, have experienced recently is finding quality child care, and yet again, the staff at Brighton Center helped connect me to quality centers.

My whole personality has changed since coming here. It's a complete 180. I knew that by going back into the medical field, I would need to lead by example. I became a CET Ambassador, helping fellow trainees and those interested in the program. I've also become involved with the Building Community Well-Being program as a member of the Parent Advisory Board and will be leading an upcoming parent café. This is allowing me to use my own experiences to help other families navigate community resources and develop our own strength-based support system.

Although it took me longer than the typical trainee, I finally completed Medical Assisting. I passed the Registered Medical Assistant exam leading to certification, which allows me to work as a Medical Assistant anywhere in the country.

My life has changed so much over the last few years. I was just surviving before and now I have a stable career path, a home, and my kids are thriving. I wish more people knew of all the incredible services Brighton Center offers and all the help provided to get people back on their feet. No matter what obstacle or barrier that has come up, Brighton Center has been there to help me navigate it.


PATRICIA'S JOURNEY

I was just out of high school with a new husband, a new baby, and new college courses when I started taking pills to cope with the stress and to handle my feelings. Another baby and more difficult courses, and my substance use progressed. For 10 years, I wanted to get treatment. I kept saying that I was going to go, but I didn't. I was afraid of the unknown and afraid of not being in control. When I was arrested two years ago they asked me if I wanted jail or treatment and I chose treatment. I came to Brighton Recovery Center for Women on October 1, 2021.

Every day since the day I came, I would say I was leaving. I told everyone I wanted to walk out and never come back. I kept going through the program, but got stuck and had to go back to the start. I didn't want to go through it all over again, so I begged my mom to come and get me, but she wouldn't. She said she didn't want me to hold it over her head that I had to spend three years in jail. So I stayed.

When I was one week away from finishing and leaving for good, I got another restart that made me want to leave. I learned from the Department of Corrections that I could walk out the door without consequences. That day is when it all changed for me, and I realized I actually didn't want to leave. I wanted to finish this program for myself, to prove to myself that I can do this. So even though I didn't really want to do three more months of Phase 1, I completely surrendered. When I first got here I was doing it for my kids, but having the option to leave is what made me realize I had to do it for myself. I wanted something different, and I had to do it for myself before I did it for anyone else.

These women are amazing. I didn't get along with women at all before this experience. I had one best friend, and we parted ways because of my addiction. I never thought I could connect with women the way I do here, but I love each and every one of these women differently. They've





impacted me in different ways. I wouldn't have wanted to go to treatment anywhere else. This place has saved my life. They've given my mom and dad their daughter back, my kids their mom back, my husband his wife back, and me my life back. It's amazing. It really is. My son says that choosing treatment is the best decision I ever made. Something I never thought I would ever get is a year of sobriety. And I have it. It's a big difference.

I signed on to be a **Peer Mentor** in the kitchen, and it was a great experience. I get to help all the girls that I've watched come in the door, I get to see them give their all, and I get to give back by working with **CENTER TABLE**, *Catering with a Purpose*. I'm getting my food service management license, and I've been working with the **Financial Coaches** at Brighton Center to reduce my previous student loan debt and get ready to go back to college to get a degree in hospitality. I have a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration, so maybe someday I'll be able to open my own restaurant.

When I think about my advice to others, I get choked up. My advice is to give Brighton Center a chance. It's what I had to do. And when you give it a chance, you give yourself a chance.

A LEAP FORWARD IN HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

Brighton Center was accepted into the 2023 Opening New Doors Institute. The Institute is a five-month, intensive training program that features both in-person and remote training, as well as one-on-one consultation with experts in the development and operation of supportive housing. Teams completing the Institute will be provided with the skills and knowledge to turn a project concept into competitive applications for capital and other funding sources, and to join a growing peer network of professionals in the supportive housing field. This intensive training will give our team the opportunity to build our knowledge base and ability to secure the needed funding and long-term commitment necessary to create quality supportive housing.

BUILDING COMMUNITY WELL-BEING

Building Community Well-Being Parent Advisory Board continues to lift the voices of families with lived experience by collaborating with THE PLUG to utilize art as a way to discover the power to make social change. They recently created a mural which is on display at Bright Days Child Development Center in Newport.

Building Community Well-Being partners with families as they build social supports, strengthen family relationships, connect to resources, and help to co-design the program. The goal is to work with key partners to develop a comprehensive community, child, and family well-being system. This project is a partnership among Brighton Center, the Department of Community Based Services, Family Nurturing Center, and Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago, and is funded through a five-year grant from the Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families.
