OUR VISION:

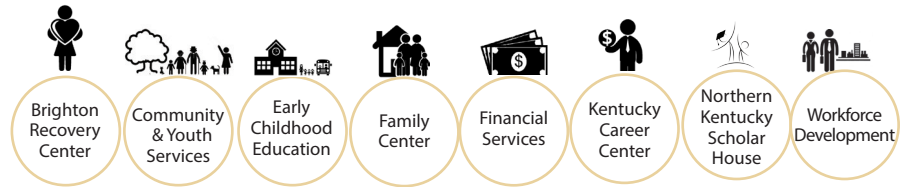
To be an innovative leader that strengthens the vitality of the community and engages people as they work and live to achieve their hopes and dreams.



During fiscal year 2016-2017 we served **44,049** individuals through **39** programs in all **8** counties of Northern Kentucky ranging from **infants to older adults**.

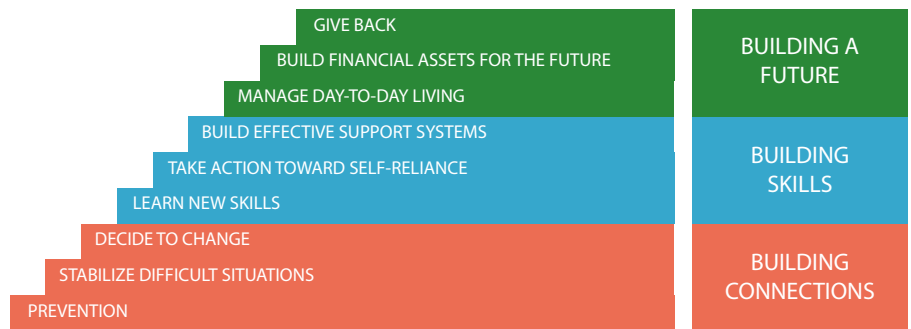
WHAT WE DO AND WHY

Brighton Center wraps a community of support around individuals and families by tackling the issues that prevent people from becoming self-sufficient, removing the barriers they face, and creating hope so that goals can be achieved and dreams realized. Many of the people who come to Brighton Center have struggles related to finding a job with a livable wage, affordable housing, quality childcare options; as well as help pursuing education without taking on more debt, and managing their finances. Where they see an impossible amount of barriers, we see strength and determination and with that, our families start believing again in what they had lost...Hope!



BUILDING SELF-SUFFICIENCY - HOW WE CHANGE LIVES

Our comprehensive approach to bundling services and programs allows us to meet the often complex needs of families. Our approach is based on the philosophy that families become our partners in creating change by sharing their hopes and dreams then setting goals to accomplish them. Self-sufficiency is a constantly evolving process and we have learned that families move through the continuum based not only on their current situation but also their long-term goals. OUR IMPACT - OVER THE LAST FIVE YEARS



33,102

individuals (or 15,487 families) received help during a crisis, had a basic need met, or received a connection to other services in the community.



4,485

children in our early childhood education programs, and 89% enrolled a minimum of six months demonstrated growth in multiple domain areas.



2,314

homeless and runaway youth received crisis services at Homeward Bound Shelter.



4,110

families served with free tax preparation resulting in \$5,667,385 in tax refunds.



70,453

individuals received workforce services such as job fairs, job readiness, training or placement.

79% of those placed retained employment at six months.



1,585

women were served residentially through Brighton Recovery Center for Women.

74% reported no relapse six months after completion.

The Center for Employment Training is accredited by the Council on Occupational Education and is approved to receive Title IV funding from the Department of Education.

Our Homeward Bound Shelter and Independent Living Program are CARF accredited demonstrating that we are guided by internationally recognized service standards and best practices.

Brighton Center is regularly monitored by external funding sources.

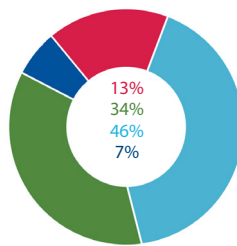
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STRATEGIC GOALS FOR A BRIGHT FUTURE

Brighton Center employees believe strongly in the community's ability to set its own agenda and to work with us as partners to achieve results. This philosophy, which is reflective of our core values and mission of the agency, guides us in our interpretation of community assessment data. In 2016, a full community assessment was completed. From this assessment came a set of critical issues that will be the focus of Brighton Center's work for the next four years.

- 1 EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT, AND FINANCIAL EDUCATION:** The education, employment, and financial education needs for our families are met resulting in a career that allows families to achieve their financial goals.
- 2 SERVICES FOR YOUTH (SCHOOL AGE TO 24):** Ensure youth have the supports and services necessary to reach their full potential and are positioned to achieve success in life.
- 3 HEROIN EPIDEMIC:** Our response to the heroin epidemic is clearly communicated and aligned with the community, and active steps are taken to ensure that the needs of our families are addressed.
- 4 ORGANIZATION:** The organization fully integrates services internally and within the community.

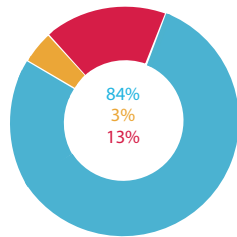
